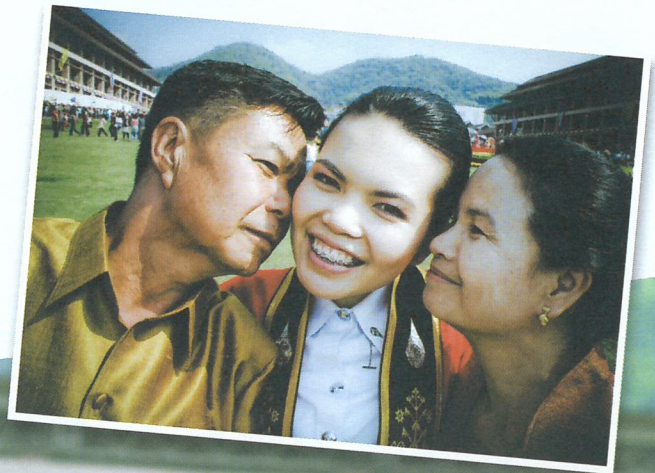

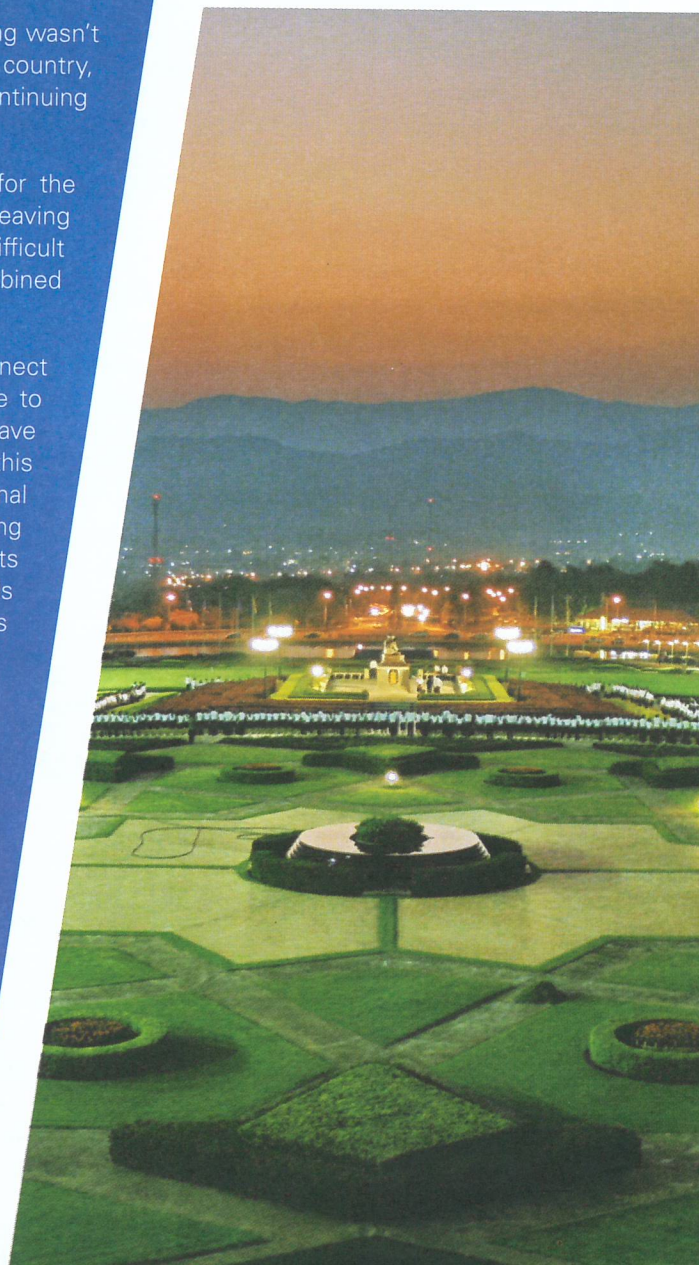

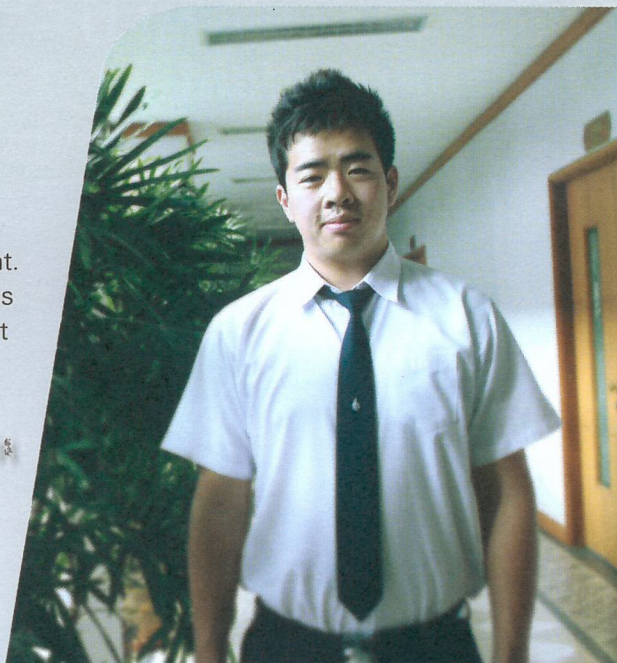

I first learned about Mae Fah Luang University when I was attended the exhibition of Thai Culture in my hometown of Kunming. I chose to study at this university because of its great teaching facilities, high-quality learning experience and the supportive environment; additionally, it is very well respected in Thailand. **These are the all the activities in my day at MFU, and I really enjoy studying here.**

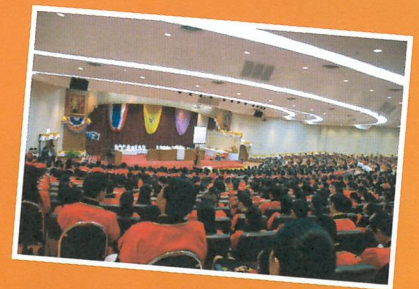
# My Favorite MFU Corners

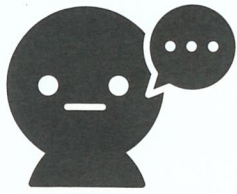

# Student Spotlight

Interview with Tanyamon Pullapalin

Tanyamon was chosen as one of 4 students to represent Thailand at “ASEAN-China Youth Camp: Cultural Trail from China to ASEAN.” The Camp was composed of 4 youths from 9 of the current ASEAN country members. The Ministries of Culture from Thailand, Myanmar and China hosted the camp from November 18<sup>th</sup> to December 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2010. The Camp’s purpose was to strengthen relations among the countries through promotion of cultural exchange. Tanyamon is a 3<sup>rd</sup> year business Chinese student in the School of Liberal Arts at MFU. Although she is originally from Bangkok, she likes Mae Fah Luang University because she gets to escape the traffic in Bangkok and “life here is better for studying.”

## Tell me about the selection process. How were you chosen?

I heard about the Camp from a MFU lecturer who teaches an ASEAN studies course. I decided to apply even though the application was very long. Originally the Ministry of Culture chose about 40 students from Thailand. There was a 3-day camp in Kanchanaburi, where students were tested about their knowledge of culture and were observed to see how they got along with other students. In the end, 4 youth ambassadors were chosen.

## How did you feel once you were selected?

Actually I was in the hospital with my grandmother when I found out. I read the email on my phone and I was so happy. But then my mom thought that maybe a friend of mine was playing a joke. So I called the Ministry of Culture and they confirmed that I was actually selected, it wasn't a joke.

## Once selected, did you guys have a training course or something?

Once selected, I attended a training course before the Camp began. There I had to learn and practice some traditional Thai dances, and create some materials to help me promote Thai culture.

## So what countries did you go to and what did you do there?

The first country was Thailand. Since this is my home country, I was happy to share my culture with the other participants. I also got a chance to see more of Chiang Rai province. Myanmar was the next country. There we visited the National University of Arts and Culture in Yangon. There I learned the Myanmar style of dance, and how to paint and make sculptures. I really had a lot of fun. The final stop was China, where we were hosted by Kunming University of Science and Technology. There I had a chance to perform traditional Thai dance for students at the Huaxia Handicapped School. I also got a chance to practice my Chinese.

## Did you like the countries you visited?

I loved visiting both countries. In Myanmar, we studied a lot about art and dance; we focused a lot on Burmese culture. In China, we studied a lot about technology. We visited Kunming University of Science and Technology and they had put together a fair and invited many universities to attend.

## Would you recommend this program to others?

Yes, definitely. I had a chance to do something that a lot of people don't ever get the opportunity to do, but they can. There are more opportunities out there, for those who are interested in working for ASEAN or for those who want to have cross-cultural exchanges.

## What are your plans for the future? What's next?

I plan on registering for another ASEAN program in 2 years; next year I cannot, because I will go to study as an exchange student at Kunming University of Science and Technology for 6 months. I am studying business Chinese now, and while I've received really good training here, especially at the Sirindhorn Chinese Language and Culture Center, I think actually going to China will really improve my Chinese. I am fortunate that the University has an exchange program with this KUST so I will have the opportunity to study there.

## Do you think your participation in this Camp will benefit you in the future? How?

In the future, I want to work for the embassy as a diplomat; so this provides a good foundation for that. I got to see neighboring countries, share my opinions, and I will use social networking to keep in touch with my new friends. I think this will eventually lead to a more peaceful world.

## Is there anything else you would like to share?

I want to encourage everyone to apply for the program. I was hesitant at first too. I didn't think my English was strong enough, but having all my classes taught in English, listening to it day after day, really prepared me, and my English was stronger than I originally thought. Also, the application was very long, but it was worth it. It's better to just try.

## MFU Student Orientation



November 16, 2010, a Student Orientation was held for international students entering Mae Fah Luang University in the second semester.

Dr. Romyen Kosaikanont, Assistant to the President, opened the orientation by welcoming the new students to the University and encouraging them to seek out the help of the International Affairs Division if they needed help or had any problems. Dr. Phunrawie Promnart, Acting Head of the International Affairs Division, followed by giving the students much needed information about how to navigate many educational and social issues that may arise at MFU. After the orientation was complete, the students were not only more informed, but they were excited to begin studying at MFU. ## Fulbright Scholarship

The Thailand-United States Educational Foundation (TUSEF), commonly known as "Fulbright" announces the 2010 Open Competition Scholarship Program to qualified Thai individuals for a graduate study in the United States of America **for the 2012 academic year**. Awards will be offered in a broad variety of fields with **the exception of medicine, public health, nursing and allied subjects**.

Up to nine grants will be available for Master's degree candidates who will commence their studies in the academic year 2012. **Out of these grants, one will be allocated specifically for a successful candidate who is from a provincial school and from a low-income family. This candidate will get full funding, from the Foundation and other sources.**

Additionally, for the 2012 academic year, **the Stock Exchange of Thailand (SET)** has proposed to cooperate with the Foundation in providing **up to two Fulbright-SET grants** for outstanding candidates to pursue master's degree programs in the fields of **MBA (with an emphasis on Corporate Finance or Marketing Strategy), Computer Science (with an emphasis on Security or Database), and LL.M. (with an emphasis on International Law and Securities Law)**.

Deadline for application submission is April 11, 2011.

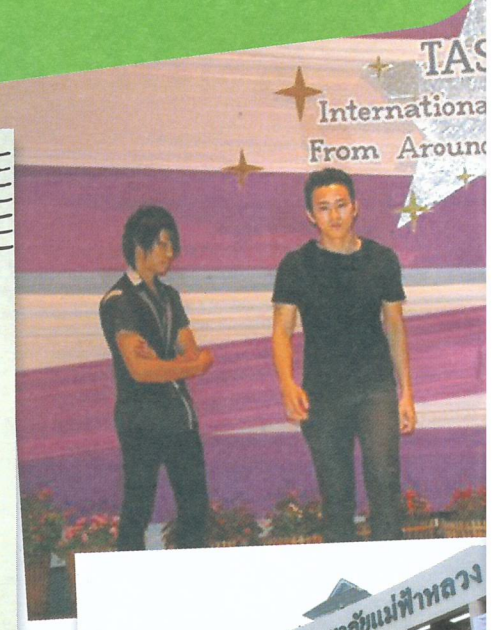
Hello Mum,

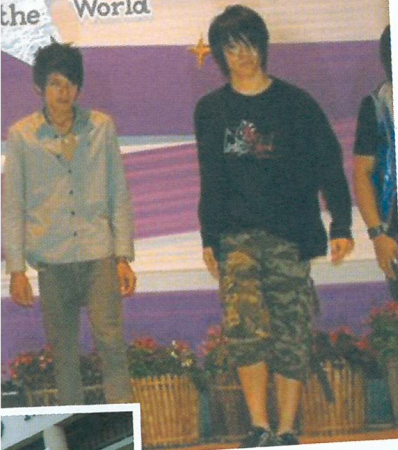


There are many activities to join at Mae Fah Luang University. One of my favorites was a party hosted by the International Affairs Division - TASTE.

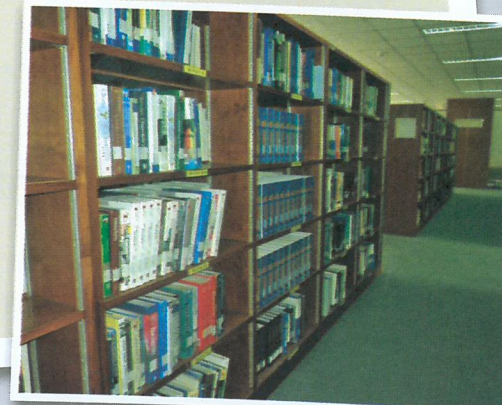
